Dr. Fahmeed Hyder is professor, an award-winning scientist, and an entrepreneur. He is a pioneer of magnetic resonance technologies focusing on early metabolic biomarkers of brain disorders, from degeneration (e.g., aging or Alzheimer's disease) to cancer. His prolific scientific career, spanning three decades, has received continuous NIH research funding to enable training of scholars worldwide, publishing impactful papers, and securing patents on cancer imaging.

Dr. Hyder has spent his entire professional career at Yale University. He is Professor of Biomedical Engineering at the School of Engineering & Applied Science and Professor of Radiology & Biomedical Imaging at the School of Medicine.

Dr. Hyder is Head of Trumbull College, which is one of 14 residential colleges within Yale College system. A Head of College serves as a Yale ambassador, presiding over the College to shape social and intellectual lives of students.

Finally, Dr. Hyder founded InnovaCyclics, a biotech startup developing next generation magnetic resonance contrast agents that are smart and biocompatible.
